| A substance found on beaches and in deserts composed of very small grains of rock            | A curved indent to the coastline which is often sheltered                                                                     | A platform on stilts jutting out into the sea, often used as a place of entertainment (e.g. Teignmouth)                 |
| A holiday destination. Examples on the coast include Brighton, Blackpool, Llandudno and Oban | A tall, vertical rock face                                                                                                    | A long narrow stretch of pebbles and sand attached to the mainland at one end (e.g. Spurn Head on the Holderness Coast) |
| A town by the sea or by a river which has a harbour, or the harbour itself                   | Once an arch collapses, an isolated column of rock is formed                                                                  | A flat area of very wet mud near the sea which is covered by high tide                                                  |
